PLOT

This film portrays one man's fervent crusade to halt global warming's deadly progress by exposing the myths and misconceptions that surround it. Former Vice President Al Gore, in the wake of defeat in the 2000 election, re-set the course of his life to focus on an all-out effort to help save the planet from irrevocable change. He is seen here as never before in the media - funny, engaging, open and on fire about getting the truth about what he calls our "planetary emergency" out to ordinary citizens before it is too late. Interspersed with the facts and future predictions is the story of Gore's personal journey: from an idealistic college student who first saw a massive environmental crisis looming, to a young Senator (D.Tenn) facing a harrowing family tragedy that altered his perspective, to the man who almost became President but instead returned to the most important cause of his life, convinced that there is still time to make a difference. That he is this year's Nobel Peace Prize winner adds authority to his plea for sanity.

LANGUAGE

The language is clear, even when Gore is explaining complex scientific observations and projections. His slightly Southern accent - he hails from Tennessee - does not interfere with our understanding of the important information he is conveying.
